Meet our New Principal ROD JEMISON

After a nationwide search and a very comprehensive process, Roderick D. "Rod" Jemison began his journey as Bellarmine principal effective in July 2023.

In the announcement made to constituents on February 3, Bellarmine president Chris Meyercord '88 noted, "I'm absolutely thrilled to have Mr. Jemison become Bellarmine's next principal. He brings a wealth of experience in all aspects of high school work, and a deep desire to give back to his roots in Catholic education, which was so formative in his own life."

As the founding head of school of United World College ISAK Japan (UWC ISAK Japan), at which he most recently served as advisor, Mr. Jemison's career in education includes experience as Upper School director, Upper School dean of students, and teacher at La Jolla Country Day School in La Jolla, California;

and teaching positions at The Branson School in Ross, California (where he was also head varsity girls basketball coach, head varsity golf coach, and assistant varsity basketball coach); Montgomery Bell Academy in Nashville, Tennessee (where he was also head junior high school football coach and assistant varsity basketball coach); and Kurikoma Junior High School in Miyagi, Japan.

"Being named principal at Bellarmine is definitely the highlight of my professional career," said Mr. Jemison. "My family and I are thrilled by this wonderful opportunity; I am humbled and blessed to be in this position. Bellarmine is an amazing community, and I look forward to my future interactions with each and every Bell!"

A graduate of Tennessee State University, where he received his Master of Arts in Literature, and of



Morehouse College, where he received his Bachelor of Arts in English Literature, Mr. Jemison also studied at the University of Essex during his junior year. He was appointed national co-chair of the 2010 National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS) People of Color and Student Diversity Leadership Conference and created and led implementation of a strategic plan to address issues of diversity involving students, parents, faculty, and staff.

Andy Schatzman, chair of Bellarmine's Board of Trustees, is enthusiastic about Mr. Jemison coming to Bellarmine, saying "During my meetings with Rod, I was impressed with his breadth of experience as a Catholic-educated teacher, administrator, coach, and genuine leader. His energy and positive demeanor were contagious. We are very lucky to have Rod Jemison at Bellarmine."

to know him when he was here last month," noted Mr. Meyercord. "I firmly believe he will take our already excellent Catholic, Jesuit education to the next level."

Nearly 100 people participated in the interview process, led by the Principal Search Committee, which helped to determine the school's particular needs at this time, vetting the applicants for the position, interviewing the semi-finalists, and aiding in the discernment process that led to this final decision.

"Bellarmine has been tremendously blessed this year to have Dr. Sonya Arriola serving as our principal," said Mr. Meyercord, adding, "She has done an amazing job in the role, and will return to her work on strategic initiatives for the school and helping to ensure a smooth transition for Mr. Jemison. We are very fortunate to have such talented educators who are deeply committed to our students and the fulfillment of our mission to help form a community that is 'for and with others.'"



Speech & Debate Team Takes Second Consecutive State Championship

After three intense days of competition, Bellarmine College Prep's Speech and Debate team won the State championship for the second consecutive year. The Championship Tournament took place April 21-23 at Carlsbad High School.

"We brought one of our largest teams ever, with 54 students competing this weekend to defend our title as state champs," noted Aaron Langerman '11, coach. "This was a state championship won not by high flying individual champions ... Instead, it was a state championship won by the breadth of our team. We had more people make it to elimination rounds and earn sweepstakes points than any other school, and that momentum carried us in the overall sweepstakes awards."

The total tallies for sweepstakes are as follows:

- Bellarmine College Prep 130 points, 1st place State Champions
- James Logan High School 107 points, 2nd place
- Archbishop Mitty 103 points, 3rd place

Robotics Team Takes Top Honors

at Silicon Valley Regional Tournament

Bellarmine's FRC Robotics Team 254 competed in the Silicon Valley Regional Tournament held at the San Jose State University Event Center April 5-8, ranking number one at the conclusion of qualifications.

"In a repeat of the Sacramento Regional, we once again partnered with Team 1678 (Davis) and added partners Team 100 (Woodside) and Team 2489 (San Jose) for the win," noted Ann Johnson, Robotics moderator. "Both Team 100 and Team 2489 played in the elimination matches, with

Team 2489 swapping in for Team 100 in finals match 1 due to mechanical issues." The team also earned the Excellence in Engineering Award.

Ms. Johnson had praise for the Bellarmine participants as they demonstrated being individuals who are for and with others. "In addition to match play, our group of CheesyCare students once again supported other teams at the event with mechanical repairs, software updates and loaning parts/tools," she said. Team 254 also volunteered with the elementary school

FIRST Lego League (FLL) students at their event happening simultaneously at the same venue, both as reviewers (judges) and as tour guides around the pit area.

Team 254 also participated in the FRC Championships in Houston April 19-22, earning the Excellence in Engineering award, and then competed in the VEX Championships in Dallas the following week. Although repeat championships were not meant to be this year, all participants, moderators, and mentors are to be proud of their rewarding and impressive season.



Theatre Arts Awards

Bellarmine Theatre Arts received four nominations and two wins in a variety of categories from the Rita Moreno Awards, sponsored by Broadway San Jose and Children's Musical Theater San Jose. Nominated students performed a 7-minute medley at the May 8 ceremony held at the San Jose Center for Performing Arts.

Venice Mayor won the Rita Moreno Award for Supporting Performer, and nominee Kavan Bhatia, who received the award for Lead Actor, performed a solo from Little Shop of Horrors. His win allowed him the honor of participating in the High School Musical Theatre Awards (NHSMTA) – also known as the JimmyTM Awards – in New York City on June 26, where Lead Actor and Actress winners perform on a Broadway stage before industry experts and compete for scholarship opportunities.

According to The Rita Moreno Awards, the competition received 36 school productions submissions this year. Out of the 263 performers evaluated for their individual performance, 45 performers received an average score of 9 or above.


alive, vibrant, and challenging Jesuit high school with great diversity within the school.

Bellarmine is taking campus parking to the next level. A new parking structure has opened at the corner of Stockton and Emory streets, across from Bob Fatjo Field and adjacent to the Wrestling Building. The four-level structure accommodates more than 400 spaces, with 38 additional charging stations for electric vehicles. The school will now have 44 electric vehicle charging stations available.

The Brigit Whims Memorial Field, where Bellarmine's soccer and lacrosse teams compete, was renovated with new turf installation completed in the month of June. Our baseball venue, Bob Fatjo Field, will also undergo renovation with new turf installation expected to be completed by the first week of August.

Garden Recognized as a Certified Schoolyard Habitat



The garden at Bellarmine College Preparatory has been recognized by the National Wildlife Federation as a Certified Schoolyard Habitat. The commemorative plaque, left, reads: "This site is recognized for its commitment to sustainably provide the essential elements of wildlife habitat and provide students a place to learn outdoors and connect with nature."

Since 1996, the National Wildlife Federation has worked to assist schools in the creation of Schoolyard Habitats®, which create and restore wildlife habitat on school grounds while providing outdoor classrooms for learning across the curriculum. There are currently more than 10,000 schools that have been certified through this program.



These wildlife habitats become places where students not only learn about wildlife species and ecosystems, but also outdoor classrooms where they hone their academic skills and nurture their innate curiosity and creativity.

As noted in its Mission of Environmental Sustainability: "As a Catholic high school in the Jesuit tradition, Bellarmine College Preparatory is committed to serving God by educating our community about ecological stewardship and solidarity with creation, and by modeling that stewardship and solidarity in the day-to-day operations of our school."





Bellarmine Recognized **Nationally and Statewide** for its Environmental Initiatives



Bellarmine College Preparatory has earned the distinction as a Green Ribbon School by the U.S. Department of Education (ED-GRS), one of only 26 schools (and one of two high schools in California), 11 districts, and four postsecondary institutions nationwide to be so honored. Additionally, for the second time since 2021, the school has been designated as a 2023 California Green Ribbon School (CA-GRS), the corresponding state award for the U.S. Department of Education's Green Ribbon Schools recognition.

As announced by Tony Thurmond, California State Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Green Ribbon program recognizes schools and school districts across the state for environmental excellence and demonstrated achievement of the three Pillars of ED-GRS, as follows:

Pillar I: Reduce environmental impact and costs;

Pillar II: Improve the health and wellness of schools, students, and staff;

Pillar III: Provide effective environmental education, which teaches many disciplines, and is especially good at effectively incorporating STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics), civic skills, and green career pathways.

"Bellarmine is enormously proud of our institutional commitment to environmental sustainability," noted Dr. Sonya Arriola, Bellarmine's principal. "It is our deepest desire that our students and community see this recognition as a continued call to action – to use their collective talents to study, and ultimately address, the complex challenges facing our world around climate and sustainability."

Among the many examples of Bellarmine's sustainability programs are its unique garden, which is used for outdoor course instruction that has included Botany, Marine Biology, and California History; use of biodegradable and environmentally friendly products in the kitchen; use of refillable water bottles instead of single use, disposable plastic; installation of rooftop solar panel systems; and the use of a co-generator for electrical power for the main campus and, as a byproduct, heating of the 600,000 gallon swimming pool.

Bellarmine builds student capacity for eco-literacy within

its sustainable engineering projects in its Maker Lab and Advanced Placement Environmental Science courses. Between the two courses, almost every student participates in some form of environmental literacy education. "The challenges posed both by the pandemic and by climate change have driven home the importance of modernizing school facilities, embracing sustainability, prioritizing health and wellness, and improving learning conditions for students, especially in underserved communities," said Miguel Cardona, U.S. Secretary of Education, in the announcement

to congratulate the educators, school leaders, students, families, and advocates engaged in this work for showing the nation that any school in any community can strive to be a green school, and in doing so, empower the next generation to build a healthier, more equitable, and more sustainable nation."

This gesture of empathy and generosity was commemorated on a wooden plaque (pictured below) roughly translated as follows: "The students of Bellarmine in San Jose, U.S.A., have sent a generous donation for the science facilities of our institute. This is due to their pure sacrifice during the Lenten Season. We will forever be grateful to them for their beautiful friendship and love that transcends oceans."

Athletics Highlights by Kevin Saldivar '04, CAA, Director of Athletics

CROSS COUNTRY

It was another successful season for our runners as the Bells captured their second straight WCAL championship. It was the 29th league title in the program's storied history, the most of any WCAL school. The team was runner-up at the CCS meet, finishing just two points behind Milpitas and qualifying easily for CIF Championships. They ran hard to close out the Fall, finishing 18th in the State of California and placing ahead of Milpitas to earn some satisfying revenge.

FOOTBALL

The football team qualified for the CCS Division II playoffs despite an injury-marred regular season, then hit their stride at just the right time to pull off a memorable postseason run. The Bells toppled Menlo-Atherton and Wilcox to advance to the title game, then prevailed over league rival St. Ignatius, 21-14, to claim the program's eighth CCS championship and first since 2015. The victory qualified the Bells for a CIF NorCal playoff game, which they hosted for the first time in school history. Despite rainy conditions, the squad powered their way to an impressive 35-21 win over Vanden High School to bring home their second NorCal championship. The Bells capped off their historic season with an inspired effort in the CIF Division 3A State championship game against Laguna Hills High School but came up just short in a 28-27 thriller.



WATER POLO

This was a standout season for Bellarmine water polo as the varsity team competed in a CIF NorCal championship game for the first time in school history. After finishing second to Sacred Heart Prep in both the WCAL and CCS, the Bells notched a huge victory over De La Salle in the NorCal semifinals to earn the chance to play for their first title. They battled hard, but fell yet again to SHP in the championship game to end the season as the #2 team in Northern California.



BASKETBALL

First-year head coach Alex Sarrett's tenure started with a bang as the basketball team captured the CCS Division I championship with playoff victories over Branham, Palo Alto, and Los Gatos. The program's 15th CCS championship earned the Bells a trip to CIF NorCal playoffs, where they had not won a game since 2016. The squad headed up to Moreau Catholic for the first-round matchup and pulled off a dramatic victory thanks to a last-second shot by senior Tariq Weiser. The season came to an end with a hard-fought loss to Vanden in the NorCal semifinals.



SOCCER

Despite playing one of the toughest schedules in all of California and battling through an extremely competitive WCAL, the soccer team experienced championship glory once again in 2022-23. The Bells defeated Pajaro Valley, 4-1, in the CCS Division I title game to add a 22nd CCS championship to the program's trophy case. It was Bellarmine's fifth section title in the last seven years and earned them a spot in the CIF NorCal Division II playoffs. The squad played three straight road games and traveled over 900 miles as they advanced through the NorCal bracket with shutout victories over Bishop O'Dowd and Jesuit High School. The Bells played to a 1-1 tie through regulation and overtime against top-seeded Rio Americano in the title game, then won 4-1 in penalty kicks to claim the program's second NorCal championship as senior goalkeeper Nic Thiele capped off his incredible postseason performance with a pair of penalty-kick saves.

WRESTLING

Spirits were high in the Wrestling Center this year as the Bells were finally able to experience a season unrestricted by health and safety protocols. Senior Diego Robles was the program's shining star as he claimed the WCAL championship in the 170lb. division, finished as CCS runner-up, and placed in the top 32 at the CIF State championship meet.

BASEBALL

On the baseball diamond, the Bells fought through a gauntlet of a WCAL schedule that featured seven opponents who qualified for CCS playoffs, including the top-ranked team in Northern California. The squad nonetheless turned in an impressive season, racking up 21 victories and earning the #2 seed in CCS Division II tournament. They defeated Santa Cruz in the first round and edged out league rival Serra in the semifinals to set up a showdown with Leigh High School in the championship game at Excite Ballpark. Senior Paul Montgomery rose to the occasion, tossing a complete game to lead the Bells to a 2-0 shutout victory and the program's first CCS title since 2006.

GOLF

The Bellarmine golfers played several prestigious courses this year and covered a great deal of mileage with trips to Nevada and Palm Springs. The experience prepared them well for the playoff events as the Bells won their 30th WCAL league title and finished fifth in the CCS championship tournament, highlighted by an impressive rookie campaign from freshman Ryan Pupach.

LACROSSE


On the lacrosse field, the Bells undertook an extremely challenging schedule of games in order to prepare themselves for the postseason. They ultimately fell to St. Ignatius, the #1 ranked team in California, in the semifinals of both the WCAL and CCS playoffs.

SWIM AND DIVE

Bellarmine turned in another successful season in swim program's storied history, taking home first place at the Oak Ridge Invitational, capturing the 29th WCAL championship, and qualifying for CIF State Championships. The team's top diver, senior Jack Clark, had an outstanding season finishing first at the St. Ignatius Invitational, second in the WCAL, and fifth at the State championship meet.

TENNIS

Despite numerous re-scheduled matches due to the rainy weather in the first few months of 2023, the varsity tennis team persevered and brought home the school's 39th WCAL championship, the 39th in school history. The Bells earned the #4 seed in the CCS tournament and topped Sacred Heart Prep in the first round before suffering a narrow tiebreak defeat to Saratoga High School. Individually, Martin Dimitrov (freshman) qualified for the CCS singles tournament and defeated his first-round opponent before falling in the quarterfinals.



TRACK AND FIELD

The track and field team continued its reign atop the league by racing to its 14th consecutive WCAL championship! This year the Bells were fueled by their jumpers, led by James Buellesbach (junior), who was CCS runner-up in the 110M hurdles, and Kenneth Tucker (junior), who was CCS champion in the triple jump and went onto place seventh at the CIF State championship meet.

VOLLEYBALL

The Spring volleyball season was highlighted by a championship at the Harbor High School tournament, which included a thrilling threeset win over Valley Christian. The Bells fell in the CCS playoffs to eventual NorCal champion Carlmont High School.



COACH TOY is California's Coach of the Year

The National High School Strength Coaches Association (NHSSCA) has recognized our very own Michelle Toy as State Coach of the Year in California for Regions 4-5.

Coach Toy, who began her position at Bellarmine in 2012, received endorsements for the honor from both Mr. Chris Meyercord '88, Bellarmine's president, and from Mr. Patrick McCrystle, teacher and head coach of Bellarmine's track and field and cross country programs.

Per the organization, the National High School Strength Coaches Association exists to "educate, equip, and empower coaches to make a lasting impact on the lives of student-athletes" and is "committed to developing coaches that are trustworthy, knowledgeable, effective, passionate, and transformational."

Those attributes are certainly evident in Coach Toy's passion for health and fitness and her positive, enthusiastic spirit. "She has taken the position of strength and conditioning coach and turned it into a school-wide position with far-reaching positive effects for our whole 1,650-person student body," noted Mr. McCrystle in his letter of recommendation to the NHSSCA on behalf of Coach Toy. This sentiment is echoed by Mr. Meyercord in his letter of recommendation. "She fosters an atmosphere in the weight room that makes it a desired destination for people to go," he wrote, adding that "They know they'll be in a positive, encouraging environment where everyone treats the facility and one another with respect and motivates one another to get more fit."

"The moment I was nominated for State Coach of the Year for California, I felt incredibly seen," Coach Toy reflected recently. "As a woman in a male dominated industry, I often feel women get overlooked, so this nomination and selection was very validating! As a kid I competed in sports year-round and knew I wanted my career to be sports-related as well. So, to be recognized just 11 years into my career for something that I am so passionate about is surreal."

David Diaz-Infante '82 Named New Head Varsity Football Coach

Following an extensive search, David Diaz-Infante '82 has been named Bellarmine College Preparatory's new head varsity football coach. The move comes after Jalal Beauchman's '06 March announcement that he was stepping down after three seasons coaching the Bells and leading the program to CCS and CIF NorCal championships this season. Coach Diaz-Infante is a 1982 Bellarmine graduate and a member of the first CCS championship football team in 1981 for the Bells. After serving as a team captain for the Bells, Diaz-Infante played for San Jose State from 1982-1987 where he again served as team captain for a Spartans team that finished top 20 in the nation his senior year. He took his leadership skills to the NFL and played for the San Diego Chargers, Denver Broncos, and Philadelphia Eagles, winning two Super Bowl championships with the Broncos. Following his playing career, Diaz-Infante was a broadcaster for ESPN and then served as a coach for the Arizona Cardinals. New York Jets, and Los Angeles Chargers. Coach Diaz-Infante is also a member of the Athletics Hall of Fame at Bellarmine and San Jose State.

"We are very excited to announce David Diaz-Infante as the next Football Head of Program here at Bellarmine College Preparatory," said Kevin Saldivar '04, Bellarmine director of athletics. "David brings a sense of pride, tradition, and hard work from his playing days at Bellarmine, San Jose State, and the NFL. His love and enthusiasm for Bellarmine football and the life lessons that the game can teach young men is what is most exciting about this new chapter of Bellarmine football. I can't wait to see David build on the past success of the program while forging his own legacy for many years to come."

There is no doubt we are a better school with him back in the community."





What's in My Digital Estate?

When you begin creating or updating your estate plan, you'll likely spend the bulk of your time on these two points: determining your assets and deciding which people and charities (like Bellarmine) will receive these items after your lifetime. But have you given any thought to your online legacy and passing on your digital assets? What will happen to your e-mails, photos, and stored documents? As more and more of our lives shift to the digital realm, it is important to consider how we can pass along these digital assets.

WHAT ARE DIGITAL ASSETS?

Examples of digital assets include:

- Social networking accounts
- Email accounts
- Shopping accounts
- Online banking and billing accounts (including any cryptocurrency accounts)
- Websites and blogs
- Photo- and video-sharing accounts
- Music and gaming accounts
- Online (aka "cloud") storage

HOW CAN I SAFEGUARD MY DIGITAL ASSETS?

- Make a list of your digital assets and passwords. Include your usernames, passwords, and security questions and answers for your digital accounts.
- Find a safe place to store this information. Store the list of your digital assets and passwords in an easy to access location such as a locked file cabinet or an encrypted shared drive. Or look into companies that specialize in the digital estate planning process. You can also contact your financial advisor. They may have software that can be used for digital planning purposes.
- Make a plan for your digital assets. Since online companies and services have their own terms of service, each digital asset may need to be managed differently. Therefore, it is important to make a guide outlining what happens with each one.

 Consult your estate planning attorney. State laws differ in this area. Your attorney can draft an estate plan that addresses your digital assets. You may wish to name a digital executor—the person you entrust to carry out your wishes for your digital assets.

DOES YOUR PASSWORD PASS THE TEST?

Sequential numbers. Birthdays. One password to rule them all. These are signs of poor password management. And most of us are probably guilty of at least one of these.

Being smart about your digital footprint starts with knowing how to protect your sign-on information. Consider the following when creating and updating your passwords.

- The longer and more complicated, the better (as long as you remember it).
- Don't recycle passwords.
- Don't pick easy ones.
- Use a password manager.
- Consider two-factor authentication, which requires a password and a second form of identification, such as a code sent to your smartphone.

WHO GETS THE PASSWORDS?

They may not seem like the most valuable assets to inherit, but passwords are the keys to your digital life. Determine who should be your "data beneficiary"—a trusted friend or family member who can access your information.



Emeritus Bishop Patrick Joseph "P.J." McGrath (June 11, 1945 - May 7, 2023). Bishop "P.J." was born in Dublin, Ireland. He was ordained to the priesthood in Waterford on June 7, 1970, for the Archdiocese of San Francisco. In 1977 he earned his doctorate in canon law at the Pontifical Lateran University in Rome. In 1979, Bishop McGrath became Officialis of the Archdiocese of San Francisco and was appointed Rector and Pastor of Saint Mary Cathedral in 1986. Ordained Auxiliary Bishop of San Francisco on January 25, 1989, he then served the Archdiocese as Vicar for Clergy, Moderator of the Curia and Vicar for Parishes. On June 30, 1998, he was named by Pope John Paul II to be Coadjutor to the Bishop of the Diocese of San Jose and was formally received into the diocese at a Mass of Welcome on September 17, 1998. Upon the retirement of Bishop Pierre DuMaine on November 27, 1999, Patrick Joseph McGrath became the second bishop of San Jose, serving in that ministry for 20 years (1999-2019). He enjoyed a warm relationship with the Jesuit community and always concluded his Bellarmine Bishop's Mass celebrations with an enthusiastic "Go Bells!"
